## **2007 North Central Conference Paper Presentation Competition**

## TOPIC: "Eminent Domain and the Engineer's Ethical Responsibilities"

The following can be used to stimulate, but should in no way limit, the discussion:

- 1. What is an engineer's ethical duty? To protect individual citizen's property or to promote development on that said property for the benefit of the public at large?
- 2. What ethical issues may arise if an engineer works for a developer or municipality who is attempting to obtain citizen's property?
- 3. Should Engineers Advocate Public Entities to use Eminent Domain Power for Economic Development?
- 4. Does an engineer have an ethical role in eminent domain cases?

## RULES:

- Papers are not to exceed 2,000 words in length, must be written by only one person, and should not have appeared in any publications other than in school or chapter/club publications. Reference citations of the papers should conform to the official ASCE Authors' Guide to Journals and Practice Periodicals, which can be found on the ASCE Publications website <a href="http://www.pubs.asce.org/authors/index.html">http://www.pubs.asce.org/authors/index.html</a>. A complete bibliography should also be included, if appropriate.
- 2. Authors must be undergraduate students and both ASCE Student Organization members and ASCE national student members in good standing at the time of submission to be considered.
- 3. One electronic copy of the paper should be submitted to TJ Bates at *tjbates* @mtu.edu. Papers must be received by Friday, March 2, 2007 @ 5:00pm.
- 4. Each author will be expected to make a 5-minute\* oral presentation on the paper. Up to five minutes of questioning by judges will be allotted following each presentation. (\*Allowance of + or 5 seconds without penalty.)
- 5. The paper portion of the competition constitutes 50% of the final score, while the oral presentation accounts for the remaining 50% of the score. A detailed breakdown of the scoring procedure is outlined on the scoring summary sheet.

## **SELECTION:**

Winners will be selected by a panel of three (3) judges to be identified by the host school. Prizes for winners

are as follows:  $1^{st}$  Place \$100.00  $2^{nd}$  Place \$60.00  $3^{rd}$  Place \$40.00

Note: Submission for the ASCE Student Conference Paper Competition does not constitute an entry for the National Daniel W. Mead Student Contest. While the paper topic is the same – and the same paper may be submitted for both contests – they are two separate events and require two separate submissions.
